NORTH ISLAND CHAMPS

Lake Taupo - Nov 2023

Due to the low Zephyr turnout at Napier Sailing Club's 2022 Summer Regatta, the ZOA Exec made the decision to revert to the more central location of Lake Taupo for the 2023 North Island Champs. The outcome was a positive, with 32 entries doubling the previous year's participation.

This was a light wind event with only a couple of races sailed in over 10 knot conditions. The regatta was decisively won by Grant Beck (715) with a 6th placing as discard. Second was Greg Wright (190) and third Andrew Mikkelsen (216). New to the class Patrick McDaniel (32) from Tauranga won the handicap trophy.

QCYC 3-4 Dec 2023

This regatta was held at Queen Charlotte Yacht Club (QCYC). It's a popular venue in the South Island and the club is recognised for running good events. Twenty nine Zephyrs entered, including four boats that made the trip over from Wellington.

Two days of three races each were scheduled for the series with the fleet sailing outside of Picton Harbour where cleaner winds and good water is available.

Day one proved to be very challenging for sailors and officials alike with very shifty winds and excessive gusts to manage, making for some exciting, frustrating and wet sailing. The Race Officer managed to get the three races in, although not all sailors managed to complete all three.

Sunday's forecast was for gale force winds out in Cook Strait and sailors agreed with the Race Officer to abandon racing that day.

Sailing inside the Picton Harbour wasn't really an option for a fleet of our size and to travel out to the course, about an hour's sailing away and then return if the forecast gales eventuated wasn't either. However, a series was completed and with three different winners for each of the races.

2024 ZEPHYR NATIONALS

NPCL 2-4 Feb 2024

The 2024 Nationals were sailed out of Naval Point Club Lyttelton (NPCL) on Lyttelton Harbour over the 2nd, 3rd and 4th of February, for the first time since last hosting 10 years ago in 2014. We had a great fleet of 59 boats with entries from across all the Zephyr centres in the North and South Islands.

The promised Lyttelton easterlies didn't occur until day three, to the cost of the Chair of the Organising Committee who suffered fines from the 'Sheriff' on each of the three days either for their failure to arrive or that they did, but two days late.

Day one we managed only one race of the scheduled three as we were sent home in a gale force northerly just after the starting signal for race two and didn't get back on the water again that day.

Day two we planned for four races but after waiting for a number of hours the forecast southerly finally arrived, we managed three races with the wind strengthening over each to 25 knots plus during race three. Most of us didn't complain about not having a fourth race, although the weather hadn't finished with us as we had to contend with a largish sea and tail wind to get back ashore via the club's slipway. Many thanks to the on-shore volunteers and sailors that returned early who all got into the water to assist and prevent carnage.

On the third day, the easterly was in by 10.00am and we got away a further three races in ideal conditions of 15-20 knots and sunshine. Seven out of the eight races scheduled achieved (pew).

Off the water we had a great social scene with good crowds in the Club house, with sponsor prizes for the days race winners and a 'sheriff' session preying on the misdemeanours, real or made up.

The township of Lyttelton also was popular with the craft bars and local eateries getting good custom. Overall, a very successful and enjoyable regatta, well run on and off the water and as usual heavily reliant upon a large team of volunteers and the outstanding support from the sponsors.

The championship places are listed below as well as the places for the non-championship trophies. Of note was the sharing of places in the top 10 by all the centres in each island. The class is in a great place.

Congratulations to Mark Orams who took the title with six wins and a second to drop.

Steve's Handicap System

A few have wondered how the ZOA comes up with handicaps for each sailor so I thought it would be good to explain it to all through this article. By way of background, I became the class's default handicapper about ten years ago (maybe more!) when attending a North Island Champs and nobody had any handicaps to award the perpetual trophy there. We didn't have finish times for each sailor so we came up with a simple ranking system to compare where each sailor would normally finish in that fleet to where they actually finished. This was simple and effective but required new rankings for each event. It also varied on fleet size etc so I started recording everyone's results as a percentage of the fleet for each major event eg Nationals, North and South Island Champs and some bigger provincial championships. Some regions and clubs still have time based handicaps for their sailors, rather like a boat's handicap. I'm aware that Canterbury and Worsler Bay do this.

The National system is now a major database of over 300 sailors who have raced in recent years. It records people's range of results (highest and lowest) but then has a 'median' score applied. This is not a strict statistical median and is varied to take into account of 'letter scores' and extreme results that distort the norm. By way of example, here is my own entry in the database (spreadsheet):

Naturally my adjusted 'median' is biased to the lower end so that the handicapper never wins the handicap trophies! It only includes, or is biased towards, recent results as people slip or improve over time e.g. I was in the top three at Nationals five times and won the N Islands twice but not in recent times and the likes of Tim Willetts just get better every year (we have just crossed over in the system, well done Tim).

I maintain this record of performances but the process to compute the outcome at major events was devised by MS Excel wiz Paul Pearson. This is beyond my capabilities but uses 'concatenate' functions to create and match unique identifiers and then 'VLookup' functions to compare event results to the database norm. Over page is the outcome of the recent Nationals in Lyttleton: -

It is good to see that the majority of the fleet perform near expectations (within 10%) so the data is reliable. This is particularly true at the top end but the bottom end includes lots of anomalies e.g. sailors who didn't complete the event or suffered multiple breakages etc.

By way of example and explanation of how it works, below shows this year's winner's entry in the database to show the marked improvement on previous Nationals in an 'evidence based' manner. That entry was (prior to/at the Nationals):

And has been modified to reflect the improved performance. The best result has been replaced, and the previous entry being added to the additional evidence.

Note some results are disregarded if they aren't reflective e.g. the last place (100%) at NIs as it was a very small, high-quality fleet.

I can provide people's records if they are interested or publish the entire spreadsheet if members are okay with that? Note I omitted names in the Nationals calculations above but you can work out where you were from your finishing position.

The handicap trophies are all about encouragement and rewarding mid-fleet sailors who have an outstanding regatta but are not in the main prizes. The top guys will never win on handicap as it's impossible for the top 10% to improve >10% to win. The original system for the handicap (20 odd years ago) just took a sailor's time differential in the first race of the event to be their handicap for the remainder of the event. That always seemed odd to me as it is all about one race ie poor performance in the first race only. There is now a separate 'most improved' trophy that recognizes improvement over the event.

Discussion points:

Regatta Discards

Mike Drummond (606) tabled the idea that regattas should be scored with all races counted. He contended the current discard practice evolved from an era of unreliable equipment where failures were often not the fault of competitors. With the advent of 'off-the-shelf' high quality rigging, fittings and ancillary equipment, any failures are almost entirely due to poor maintenance. There was also a view that competitors take race-start risks knowing that they have discard backup. General recalls slow RO's ability to get through regatta schedules and penalise those not taking unnecessary risks. Mike advised that his analysis of a number of regattas showed very little difference in final placings with or without discards. Some classes have already abandoned discards, e.g. Farr 40 and TP52.

General discussion, then a show of hands supported the proposal that this concept be placed before the Exec for possible trial at local contests. 10 for, 3 against.

Minimum Number of Races to Constitute a Regatta.

This regatta started with only one race completed on day 1 and the forecast made completing a minimum five race series appear in jeopardy. It was suggested that climate change issues might begin to affect regattas, so the minimum number of races could be dropped to three. This would be preferable to having a no series outcome. Also, getting volunteers to run regattas is becoming increasingly difficult, so more flexibility around what constituted a series might be necessary. It was suggested this should be tabled at an Exec meeting for support, then YNZ class approval. 13 for, 2 against.

Quick Release Halyards

The day one return to the Naval Point concrete ramp was particularly problematic, with a strong onshore breeze. An ability to lower the sail from the cockpit would've been advantageous. The commonly used Zephyr halyard locks prevent other than dry-land sail lowering, probably breaching the YNZ safety regulations. There is nothing in the class rules preventing quick release halyards. After discussion, it was suggested a paper with various halyard options be circulated to the members via regional chairs. Secretary to action.

CROSSING THE BAR

ZOA Life Member, Austin Ebert

ZOA Life Member Austin Ebert passed on 7th December, aged 98, after a brief final illness. Long standing ZOA members will recall him as the tireless Beachmaster at various Christchurch Nationals.

Fewer will recall that along with Ken Maynard, Maurice Hines and Bill Bain, he built Zephyrs 301-304 in Maurice Hine's garage in the mid 1970s, beginning the rebuilding of Zephyrs via a range of builders and moulds. I am still sailing #304 and Sandy Hines is out and about in #302.

My Dad lived his whole life in the same street in Redcliffs, sailing a series of home-built boats over many years and giving generously to Christchurch Yacht Club. Both he and his father were Life Members of CYC. He's an example of the many members who solve(d) a myriad of production problems to keep the class alive and thriving.

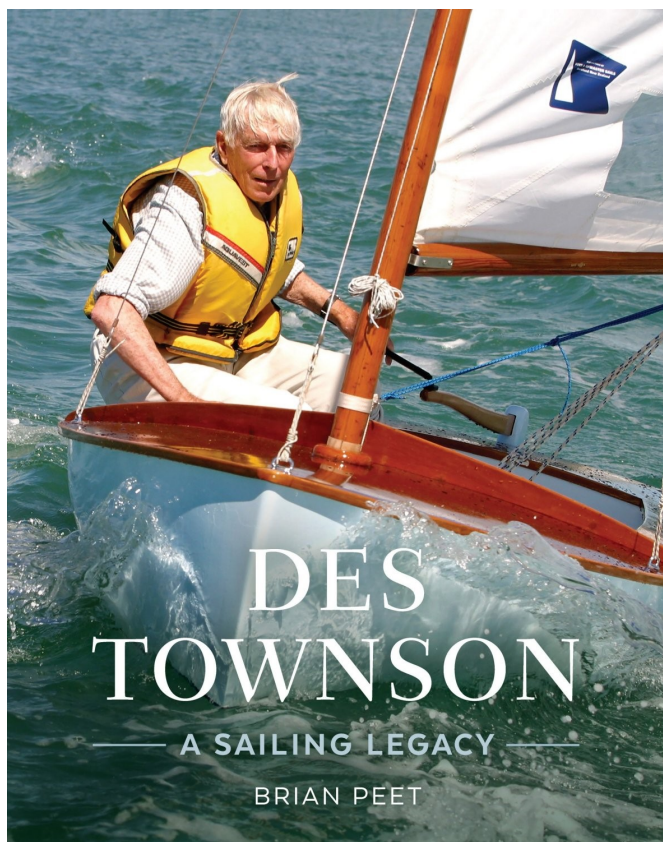
